



How to Make DIY Marshmallow Reindeer Pops

Ingredient Notes

Chocolate Melting Wafers - you can also use any type of chocolate chips for your chocolate coating.

- Large Marshmallows - not miniature ones.
 - Mini Pretzel Twists -
 - Red Candies - we like to use M&Ms or mini-M&Ms.
 - Candy Eyeballs - these candy eyeballs can usually be found in the baking aisle in the grocery store or on Amazon.
- Lollipop Sticks - you can use sticks that are 6 or 8-inch long.

Step 1 - Melt Chocolate

Melt your chocolate wafers according to the directions on the package. We use Ghirardelli dark chocolate because it's amazing, but you can use whatever type of chocolate you prefer.

Step 2 - Make Antlers

Now, break your mini twist pretzels in half for the antlers for your marshmallow Christmas Treat and set them aside.

Some may be unusable due to the way they break, but that's okay. More for snacking 😊

We find pressing with our fingers where we want them to break produces the best result.

Step 3 - Stick 'Em

Now, place a lollipop stick into the bottom of a large marshmallow. Dip the marshmallow into the melted chocolate and swirl around, making sure your marshmallow is completely covered.

You can use a spoon to make sure every bit is covered.

Tip - score the marshmallow with a knife where you want the antlers placed to make them easier to insert.

Step 4 - Insert Antlers

Next, insert an antler pretzel on each side of the marshmallow. The side works better than the top because it spreads them out a bit.

Step 5 - Attach Nose

Now, attach your candy nose and candy eyeballs and step back, and admire your work!

Allow them to dry fully before moving them around too much.

Step 6 - Enjoy

Finally, it's time to show off your creation!

Fill a short vase or mug with red and green chocolate candy and stick in your completed

Marshmallow Reindeer Treats for an edible yet cheery display for your holiday dessert table!

Dear Community Members,

As we reflect on the year, we want to acknowledge the instrumental work that has been achieved within our Nation, while also recognizing the incredible challenges we've faced. This year, we have lost valuable members and respected Elders, and we must remember them in our prayers over this holiday season. Their wisdom, guidance, and spirit continue to live on within us.

Our accomplishments serve as a much-needed reminder that when we work together, we can achieve amazing things. It is also a reminder that working against each other only takes time and energy away from delivering essential services to our community members. Our strength lies in unity, and we must remember that when one of us suffers, the whole community suffers. Let us come together and continue supporting one another to create a positive influence in everything we do as we move in 2025.

This year, we made significant strides in housing. The second set of triplexes have been handed over and CMHC approved grant funding for 4 new houses which is nearly 70% of the cost to build. We understand that some members are wondering why we focused on triplexes over the past two years. This was purely driven by cost. Canada prioritizes multi-unit builds providing approximately 60% of the cost in comparison to about 20% of the cost to build detached homes. The cost of getting workers, equipment, and materials into our remote community is a significant factor, but we are working diligently to bring those costs down and encourage key partners to continue to move this important work forward. One of Council's strategic goals is to build capacity within the community; a goal we are excited to see come to life through the new mill, which creates opportunities for skilled work among our members. This is a vital step towards self-sufficiency and long-term prosperity as well as helping to bring the cost of construction in our community down.

In respect to legal matters, we have made progress with Canada on the specific claims, with accepted claims now in negotiations and two additional claims currently being developed to further advance our Title and Rights. The litigation against DVDC and Three Rivers continues with the previously mentioned affidavits filed in court. Plans to shape a strategy to modernise our agreement with BC Hydro are on ongoing and this work will be mirrored at our G2G table as well.

Our Child and Family team has purchased a house on acreage outside of Prince George for family reunification and support - an important step in strengthening the fabric of our community. This was fully funded through the Canadian Human Rights Tribunal (CHRT) funding. In addition, we have just been awarded a \$100,000 grant from Food Banks Canada that will help us start a hot meal program for Elders in need while employing community members to run that program in the new year.

Looking ahead, the next community meeting will take place in January. Please note that the Nation's audit is complete and will be released once finalized, with an aim to distribute the financial information before December 20, 2024. Once shared, we will provide an e-mail for community members to ask questions and provide feedback.

As we close out the year, Council extends our warmest wishes to all of you for a wonderful Christmas and a healthy, prosperous New Year. Let's keep working together for the good of our community, keeping our Elders and loved ones in our hearts and prayers during this season.
